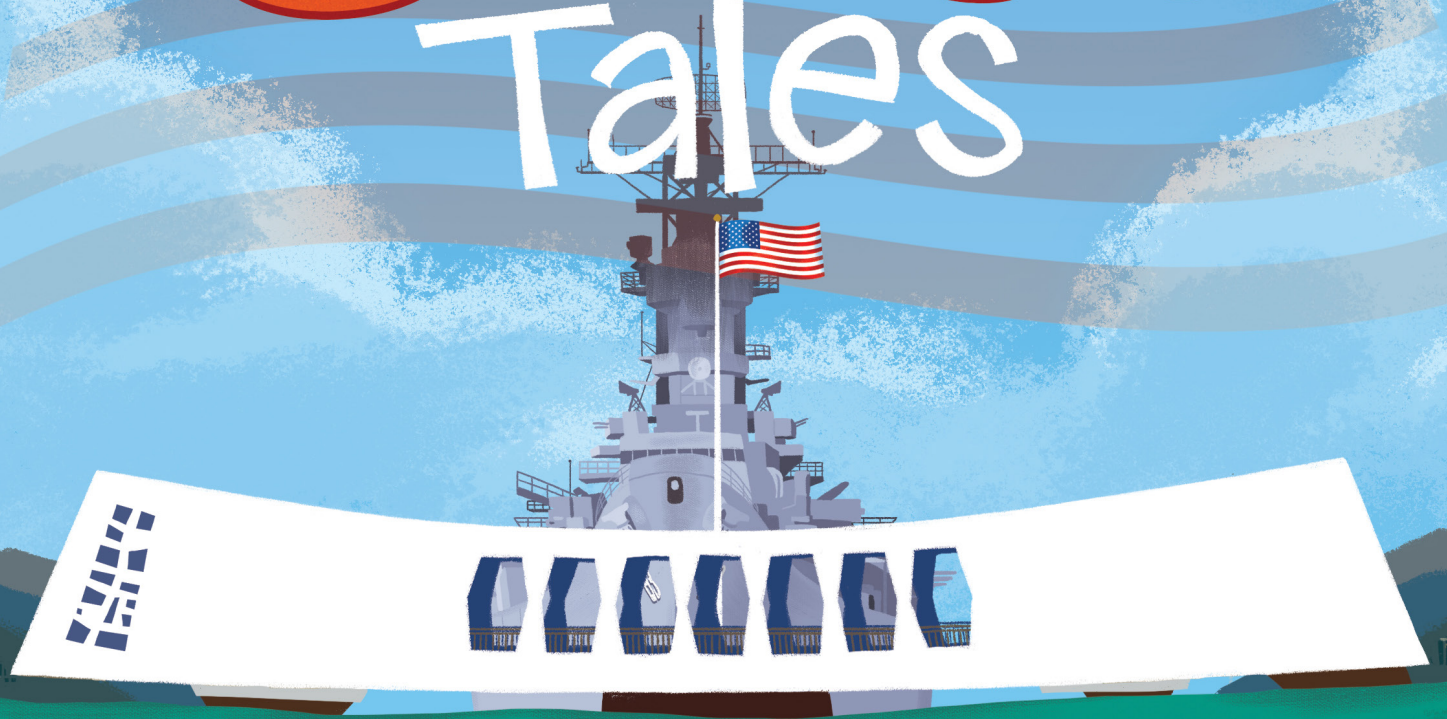

Smidge studied the picture. “It says this is the **USS Missouri** in **Pearl Harbor**. Oh! I can get pearls for my necklace.”

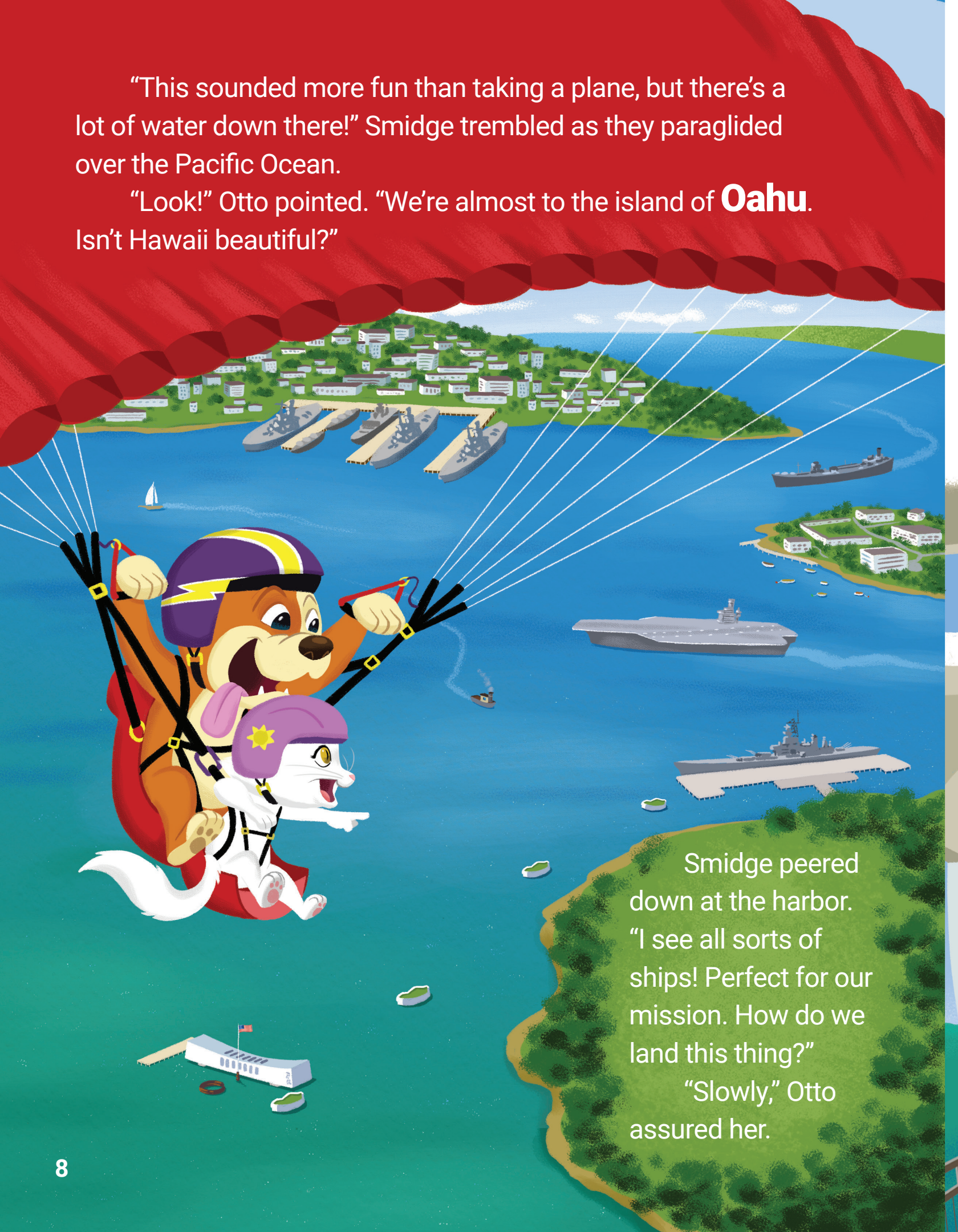


The bulldog shook his head. “Or, you could find the actual ship and figure out which part broke.”

You saved our lives.”

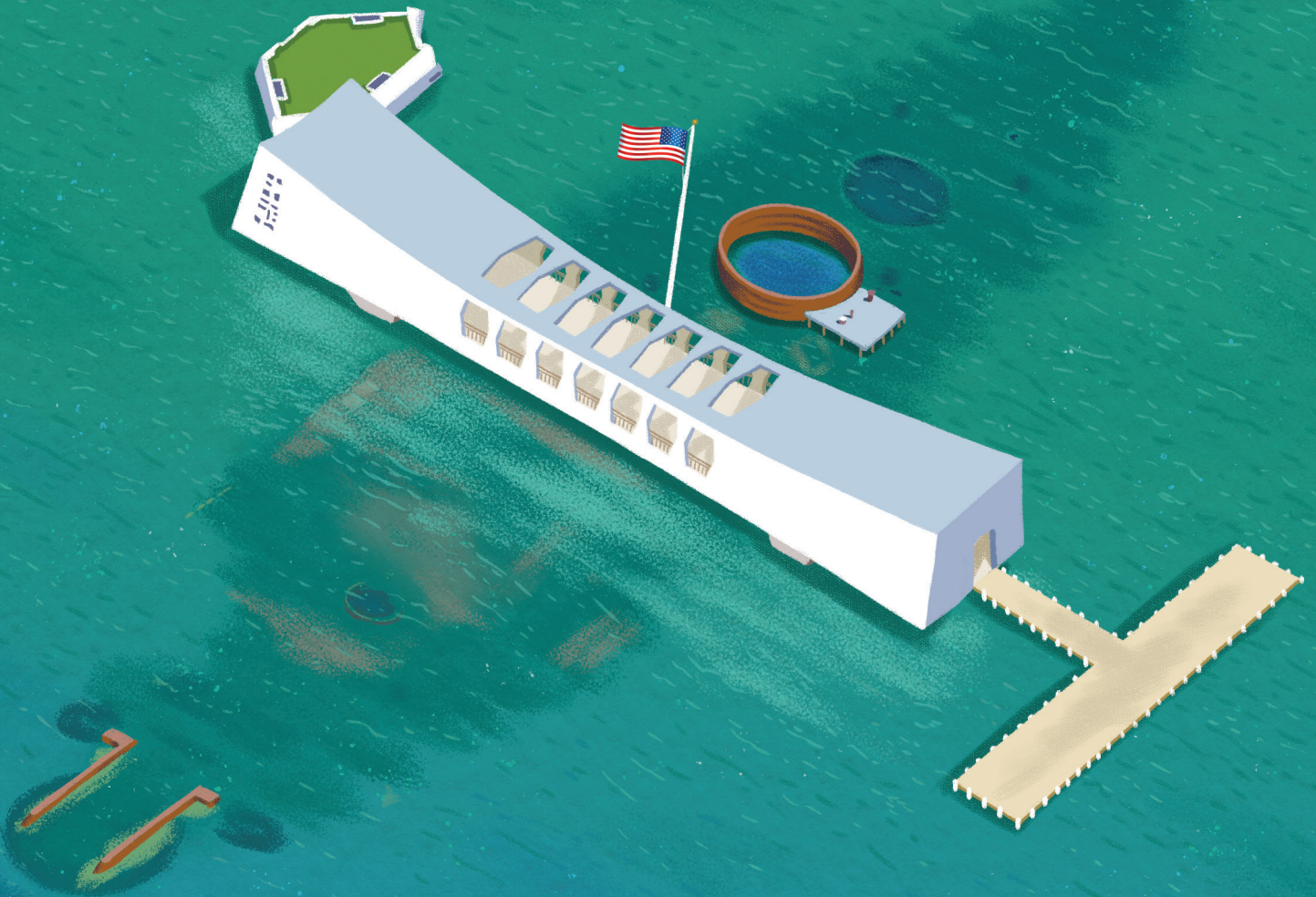
“You’re welcome,” one of the geese

for?” Otto asked.

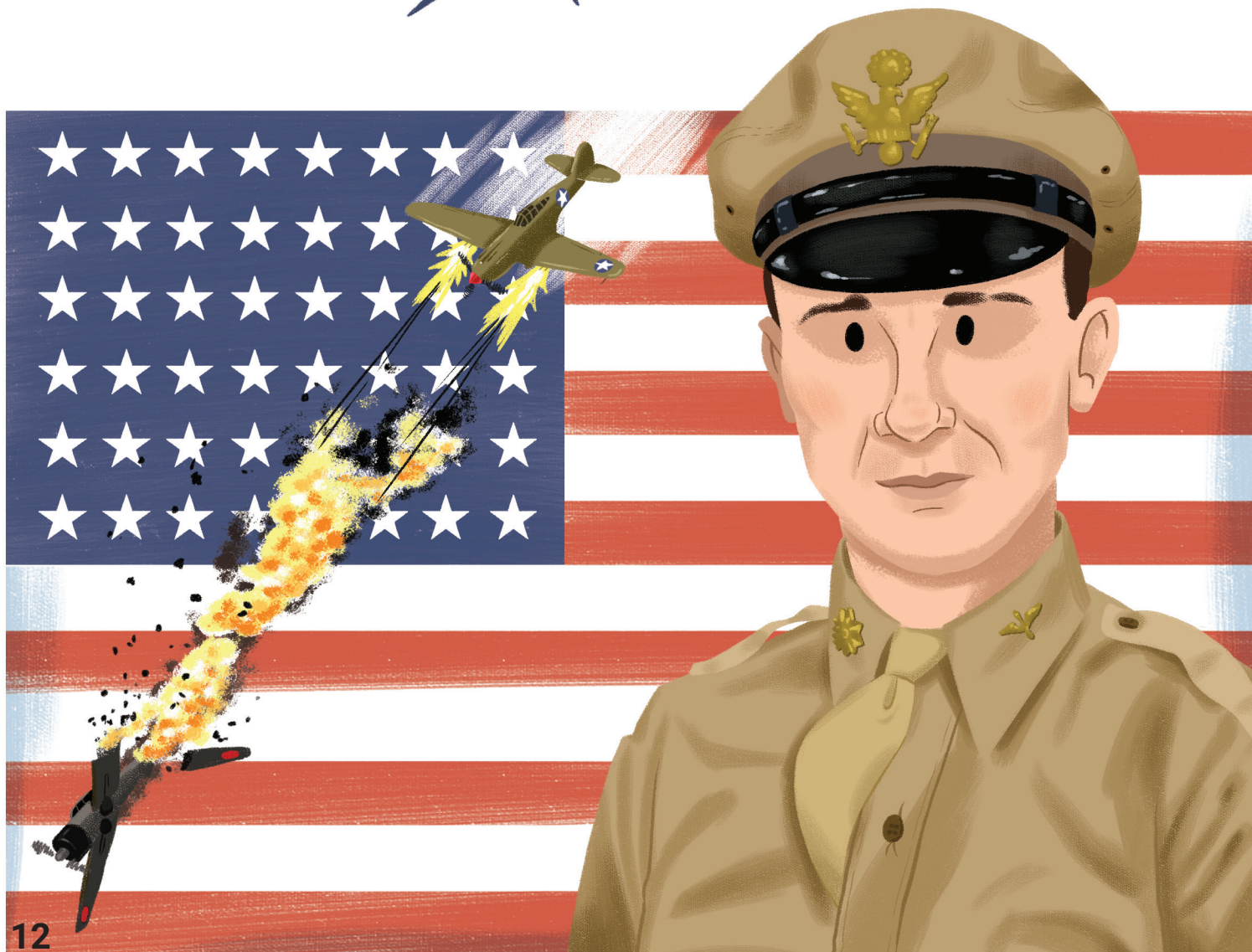
“A great tragedy in our

Smidge nodded solemnly. “It’s amazing that people can be so heroic, even when things are difficult and dangerous.”



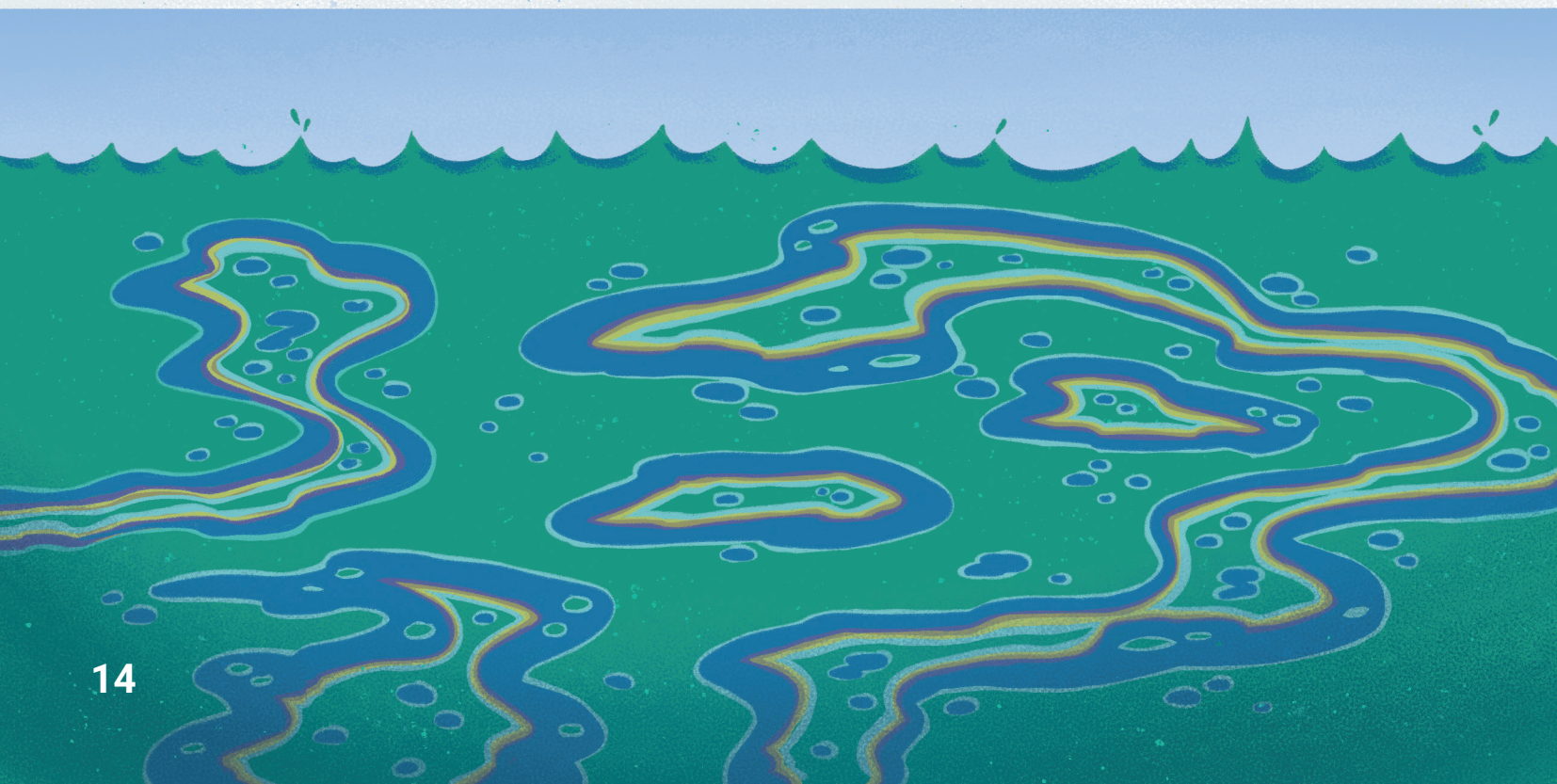
TO THE MEMORY OF THE GALLANT MEN

ON DECEMBER 7, 1941 ON THE U.S.S. ARIZONA

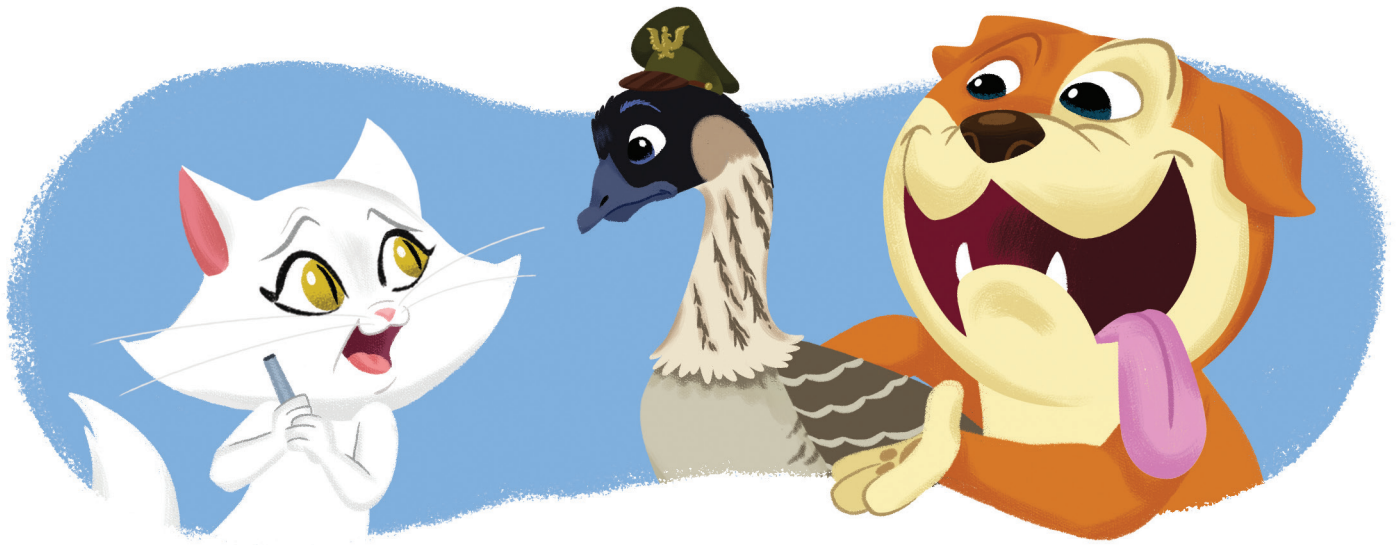


Otto peered into the ocean. "I can't believe that such a big, powerful ship could sink."

Smidge tiptoed to the railing. "What's that dark stuff in the water?"

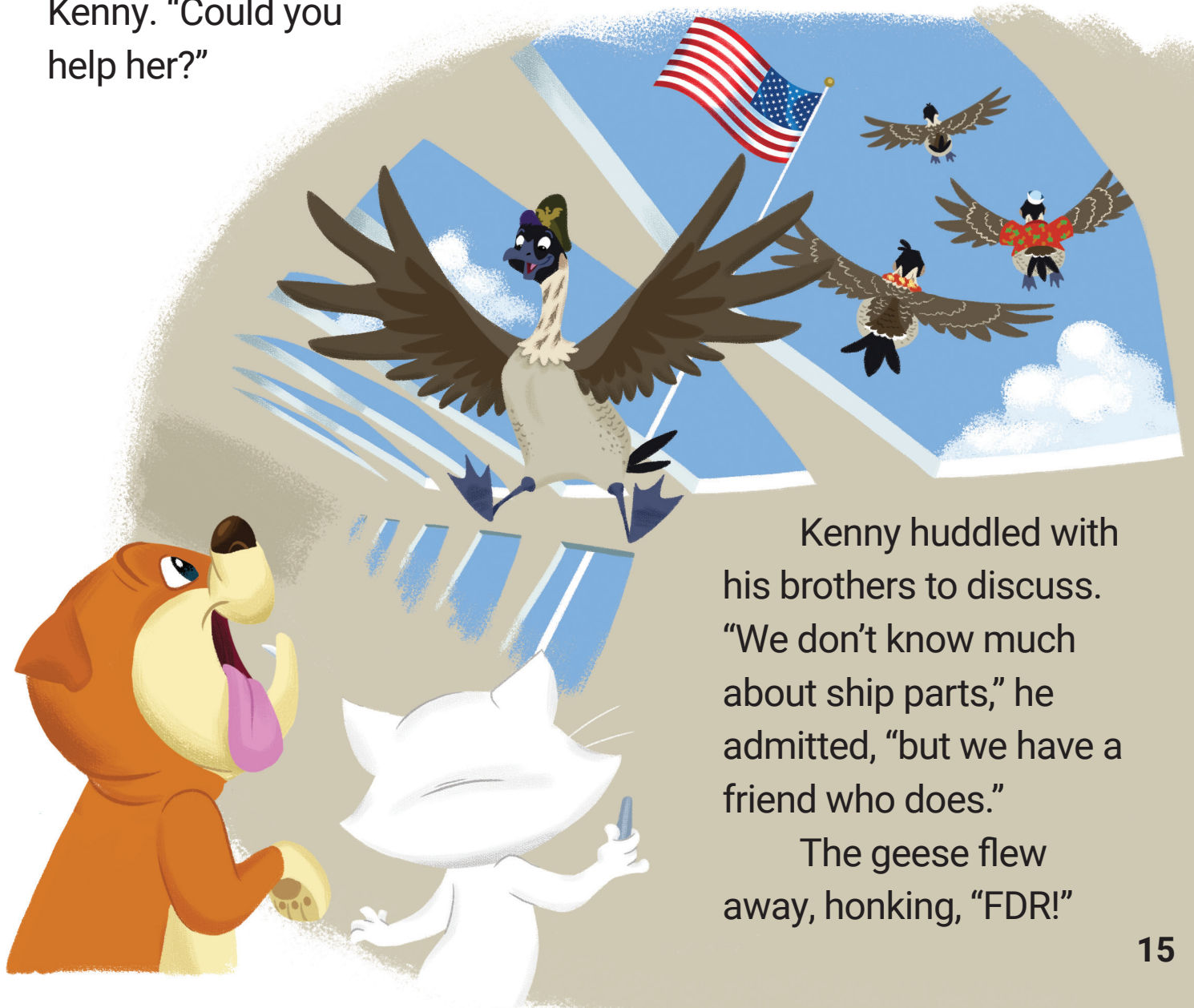
"That's the ship's oil," Kenny answered. "It still leaks to this day. We call these leaks the 'tears of the Arizona.'"

Kenny huddled with his brothers to discuss. "We don't know much about ship parts," he admitted, "but we have a friend who does."

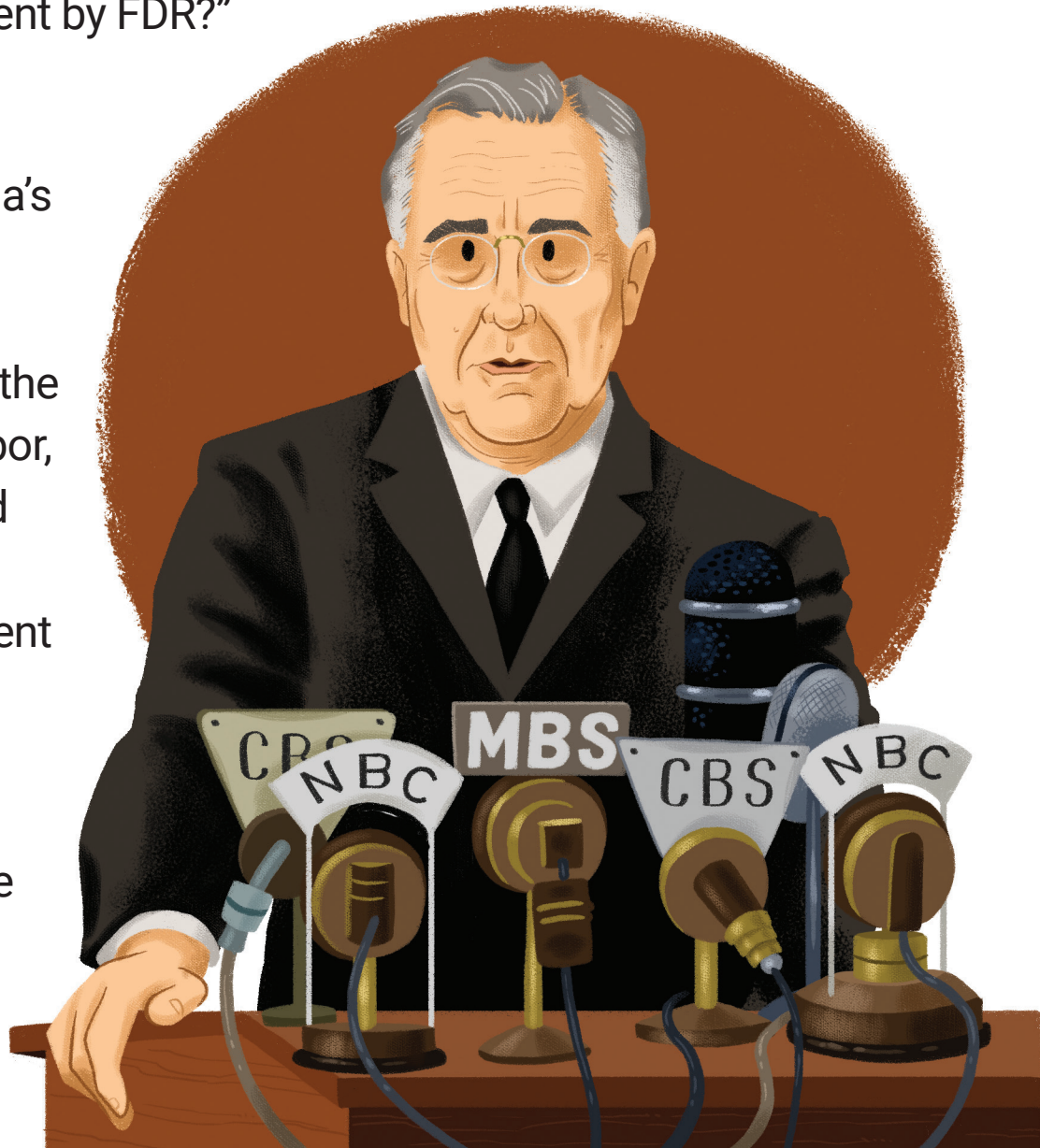
The geese flew away, honking, "FDR!"

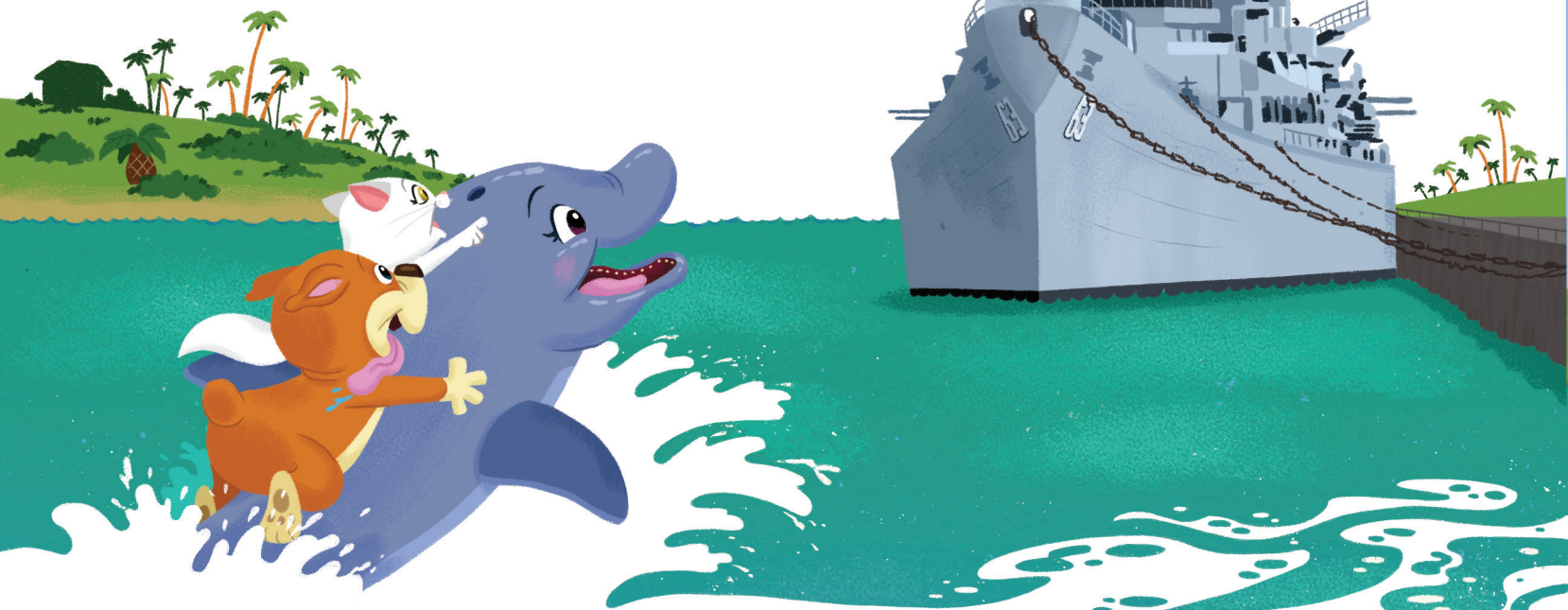
Smidge's eyes glistened. "I shouldn't have been so careless with the ship in the first place. Thank you for being such a supportive friend."

“Amazing!” Finna splashed her tail, soaking the friends.

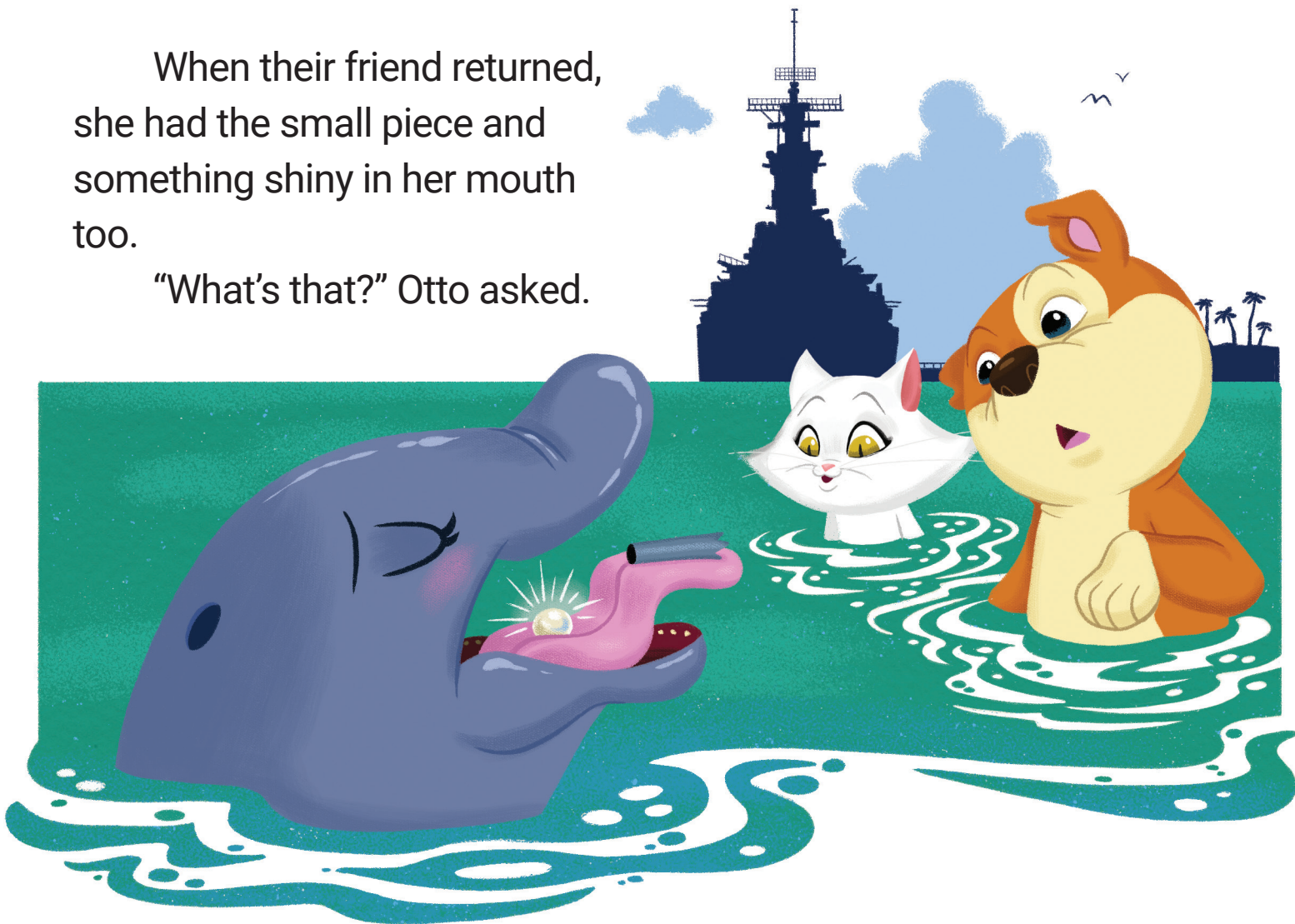
Smidge cried out as her paws slipped, and the ship piece went **PLINK...**

“What’s that?” Otto asked.



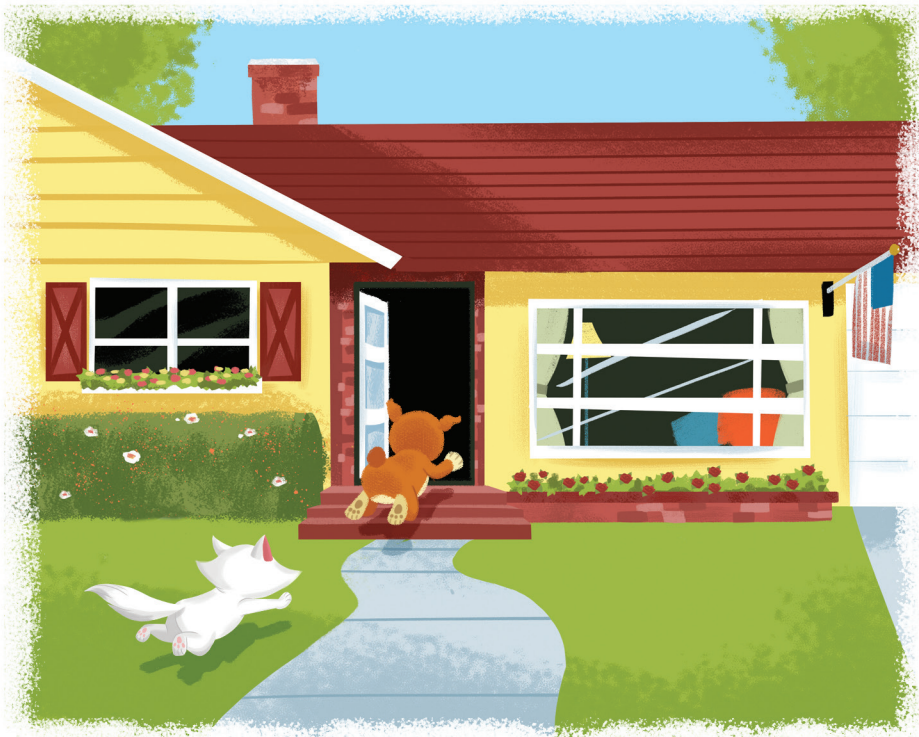
Smidge’s eyes sparkled. “A pearl!”

“Thank you! I’ll never forget it.” Smidge accepted the treasure.

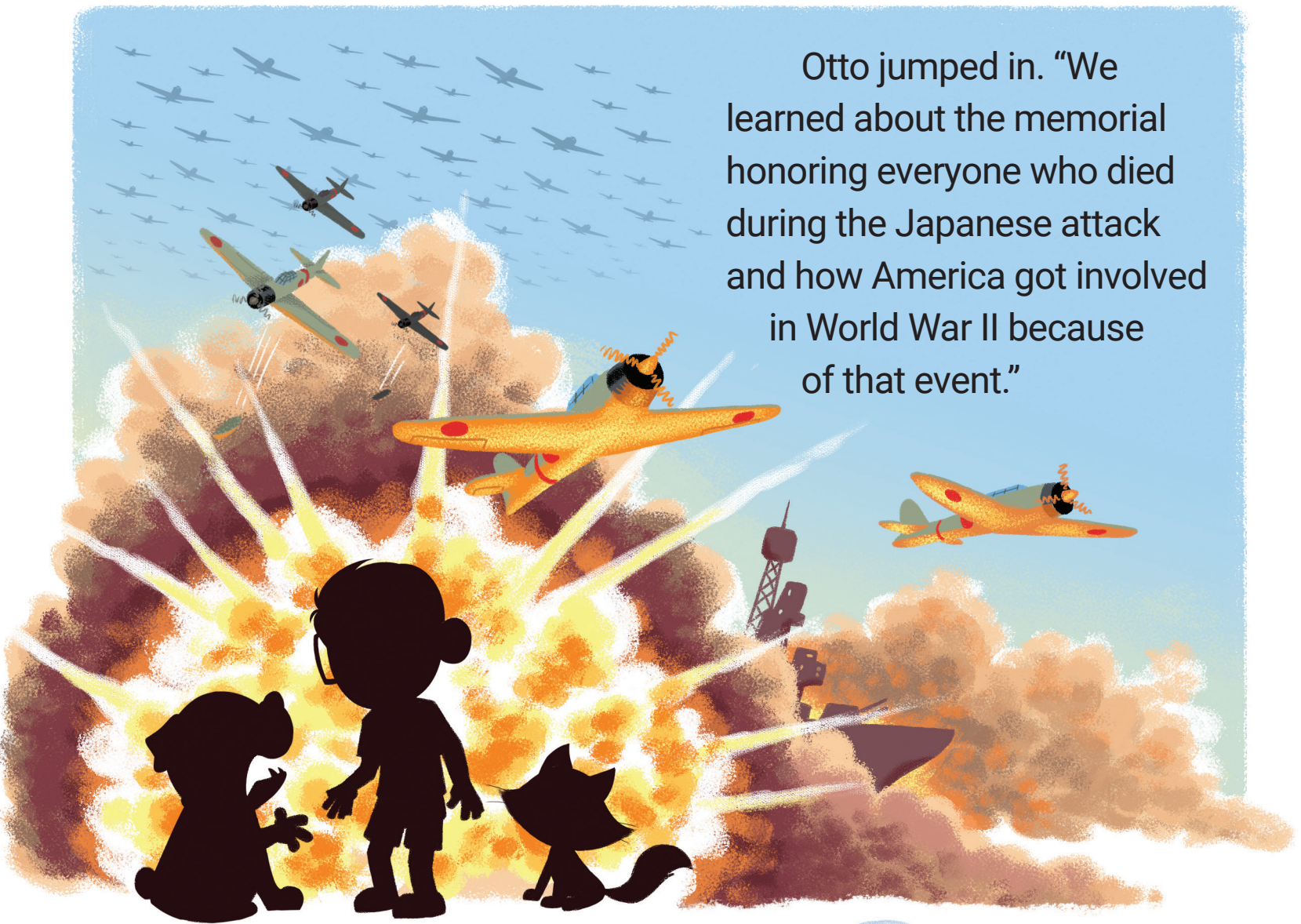
Back at Dennis's house, Smidge and Otto raced inside. Just as they were gluing the broken piece back on the ship, Dennis entered with a box full of art supplies.

As the trio put the finishing touches on the replica, Smidge revealed her new pearl and glued it to the tippy top of the miniature mast on the ship.

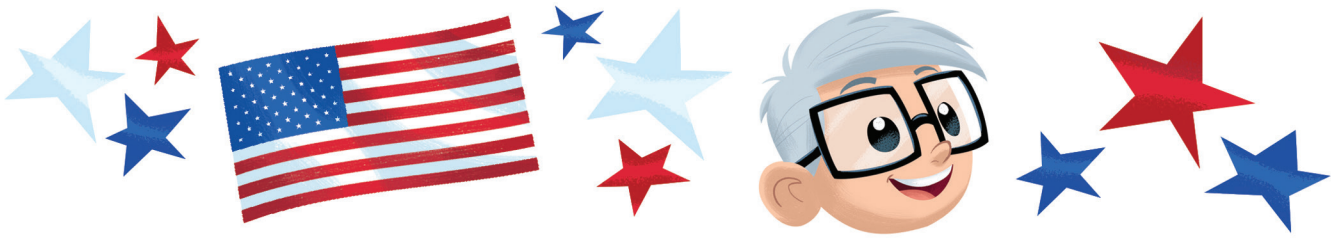
“Purr-fect!”

We Love Our History

Replica: A copy or model of something, characterized by much attention to detail.

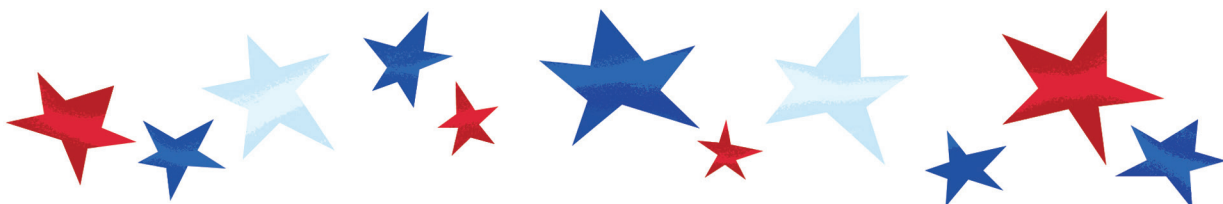
USS *Missouri*: An *Iowa*-class battleship that was built for the United States Navy in the 1940s. Completed in 1944, it was the last battleship commissioned for the United States. It was the site of the surrender of Japan on September 2, 1945, which ended World War II. The battleship served from World War II through the Persian Gulf War in the 1990s. It was decommissioned in 1992 and later donated as a museum ship in 1998.

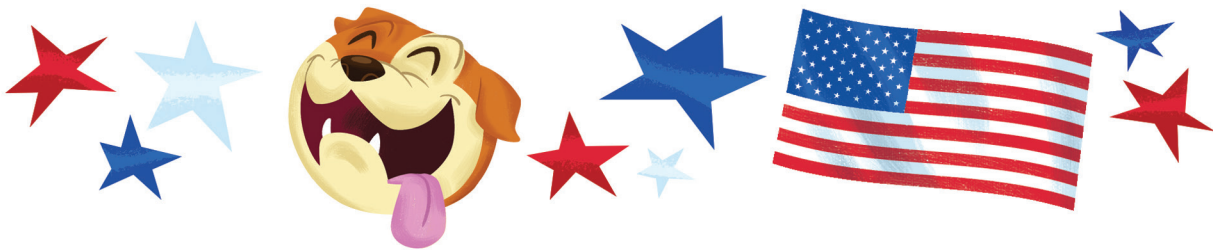
Pearl Harbor: The site of a U.S. naval base in Hawaii, just west of Honolulu. It was the target of a surprise military attack by Japanese forces on December 7, 1941, which led to America's involvement in World War II. Today, Pearl Harbor remains an active military base, the headquarters of the Pacific Fleet, and a national historic landmark.

Oahu: One of eight major islands in the state of Hawaii and home to Honolulu, the state capital. It is the most populous of all the Hawaiian islands. It features many unique sites, including Punchbowl Crater, Waikiki Beach, and Pearl Harbor.

Nēnē: The state bird of Hawaii, which is also referred to as the Hawaiian goose. It is found exclusively in Hawaii and was designated the state bird in 1957.

Pearl Harbor National Memorial: A national memorial in Honolulu, Hawaii that commemorates the events of the attack on Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941. It includes the USS *Arizona* Memorial, the USS *Utah* Memorial, and the USS *Oklahoma* Memorial. Nearby are the USS *Missouri* Memorial, the Pearl Harbor Aviation Museum, and the National Memorial Cemetery of the Pacific. With around 1.4 million visitors per year, it is one of the most visited places in all the Hawaiian islands.





World War II: A war that involved many of the world’s countries from 1939 to 1945. During the war, the Allied powers, led by the United States, the United Kingdom, and the Soviet Union, defeated the Axis powers, led by Nazi Germany, Italy, and Japan. It is considered the most devastating war in history.

Hull: The main body of a ship or vessel, including the bottom, sides, and deck.

USS *Arizona*: A battleship built for the United States Navy in the mid-1910s. During the attack on Pearl Harbor, the ship was hit by several bombs, sinking it and killing 1,177 sailors and Marines on board. The shipwreck still lies at the bottom of the harbor, underneath the USS *Arizona* Memorial, which can only be reached by boat.

2nd Lt. Kenneth Taylor: An Army Air Corps pilot, along with 2nd Lt. George Welch, who were the first American pilots to get airborne during the Pearl Harbor attack. Together, these men shot down at least six Japanese fighters and bombers. Taylor and Welch were awarded the Distinguished Service Cross.

Franklin D. Roosevelt: The 32nd President of the United States. On December 8, 1941, President Franklin D. Roosevelt appeared before Congress after the attack to deliver his famous speech, declaring December 7 as “a date which will live in infamy.” He asked Congress to declare war, which it did, launching the United States into World War II.

Nazis: Members of the German political party known as the National Socialist German Workers' Party. Adolf Hitler became the leader of the party in the 1920s and took control of Germany in 1933. The party collapsed when the Allies defeated Germany at the end of World War II in 1945. The Nazi government ruled as a dictatorship, conquered much of Europe, and killed millions of people—including six million Jews in a tragic event called the Holocaust.

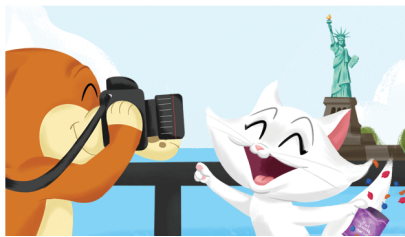

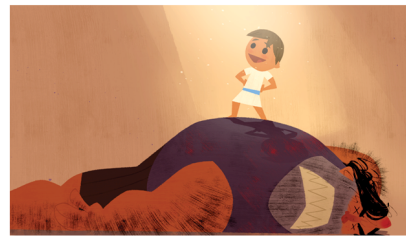
