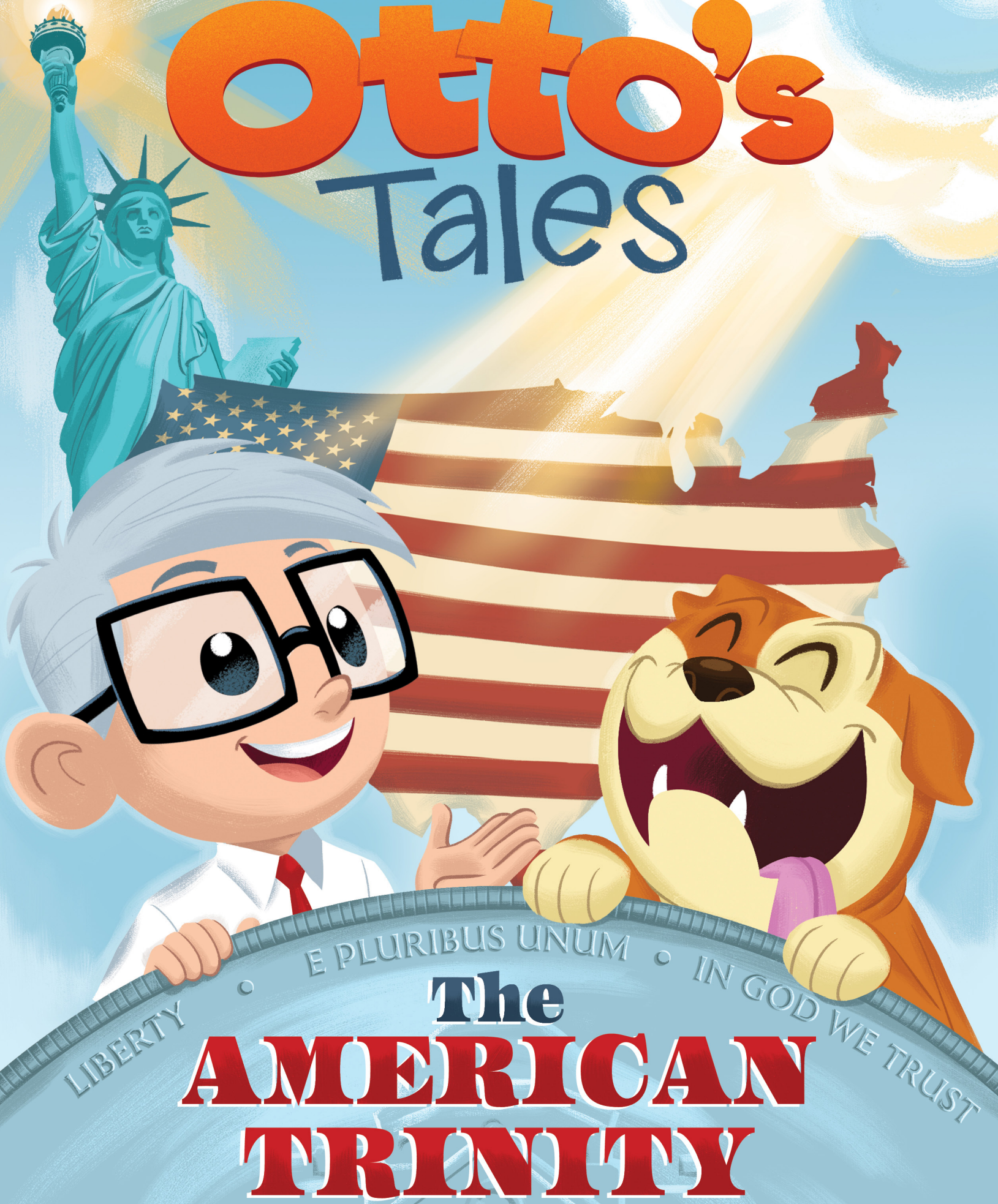

They were of all different backgrounds, ages, and races.



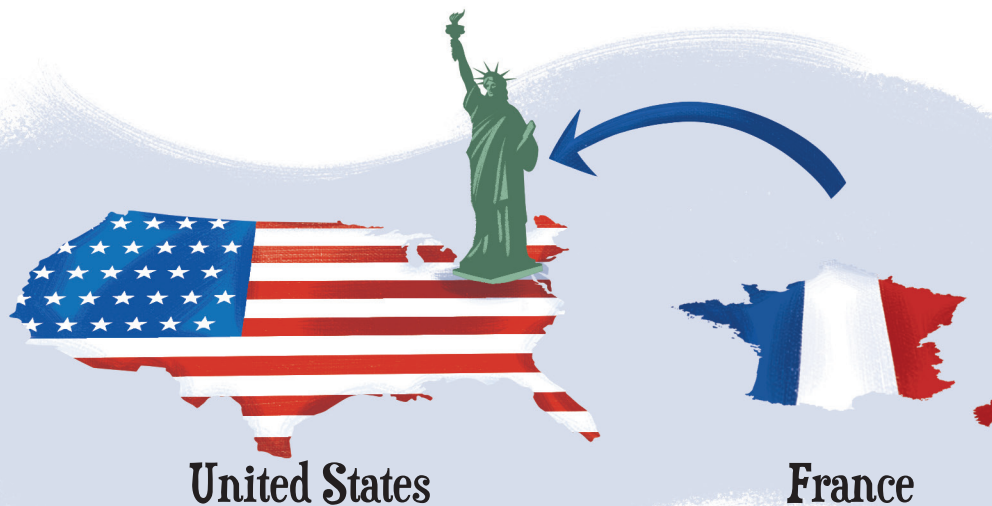
Ellis Island is the place where the big ferry came in.

“Well,” said Dennis, “they both celebrate God and freedom.”





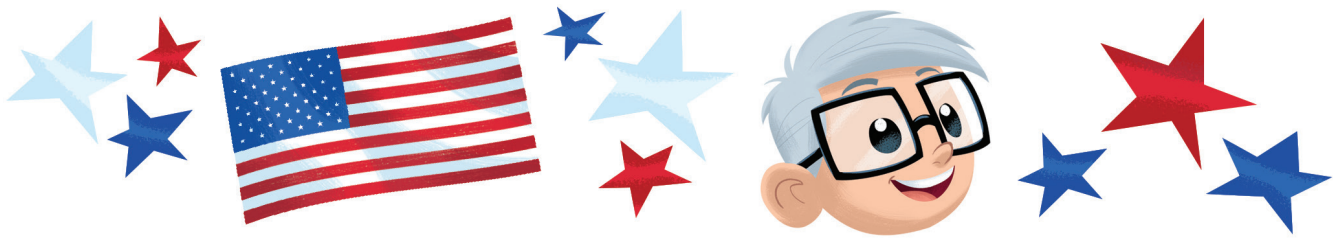
"That sounds sort of like 'In God We Trust' and 'Liberty,'" I said, "which are two parts of the American Trinity."

We Love Our History

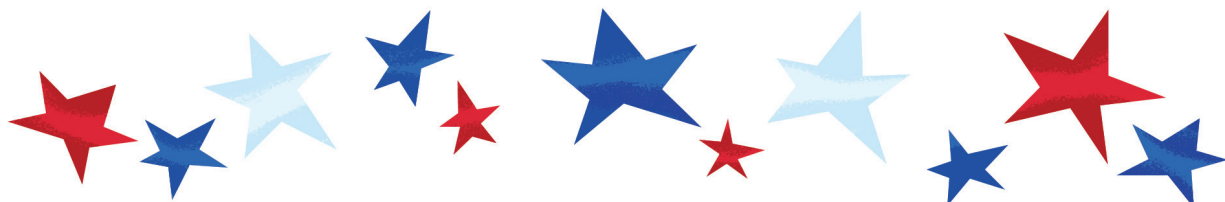
American Trinity: Three values that make the United States a unique, exceptional country. The first is a belief in liberty, that everyone has the right to live in freedom. The second is a belief in God, who made and gave everyone their rights. The third is the belief that America is one united country made up of people from different faiths and backgrounds. This is expressed in the motto, “Out of many, one,” or “*E Pluribus Unum*” in Latin. The three values are represented by the mottos, “Liberty,” “In God We Trust,” and “*E Pluribus Unum*,” which are almost always printed on American coins and dollar bills.

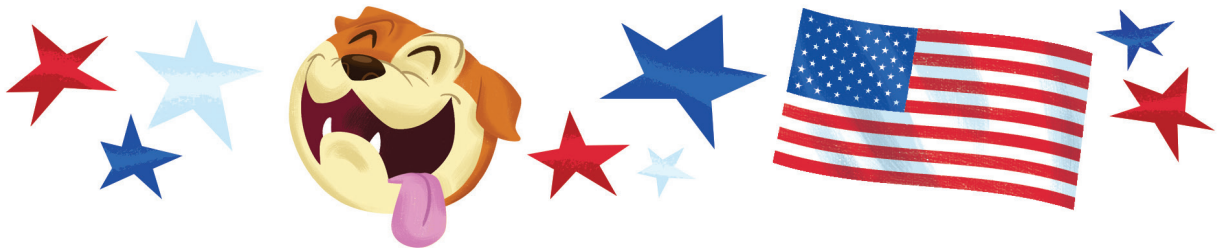
Statue of Liberty: A 151-foot-tall copper statue in New York Harbor of a woman standing upright, dressed in a robe, holding a stone tablet in her left hand and lifting a flaming torch in her right. The statue represents America’s love of liberty. It was a gift from France and was publicly dedicated by President Grover Cleveland on October 28, 1886.

Ellis Island: An island in New York Harbor which was the site of a famous immigration station. From 1892 to 1954, 12 million immigrants entered the United States through Ellis Island. Today, visitors can tour the Ellis Island National Museum of Immigration and learn about the history of immigration into America.

Liberty: Having freedom to live your life, believe what you want, and pursue happiness. The word appears on most U.S. coins and reminds us that, in America, people should be free.

George Washington: The Commander-in-Chief of American armies during the Revolutionary War, and later the first President of the United States. He fought for his country’s freedom because he believed that God created everyone and gave them the right to live their lives without oppression. There is a big monument to him in Washington, DC.



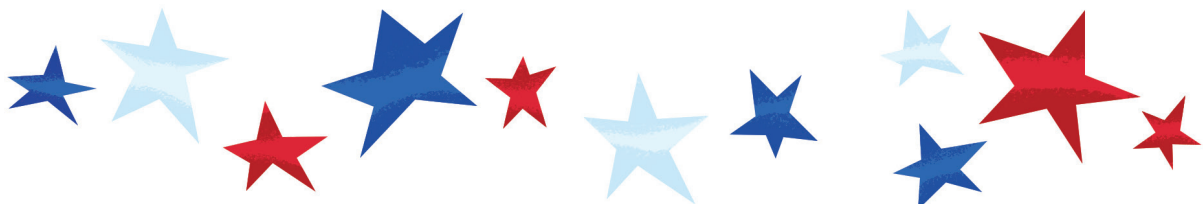


Valley Forge: A campsite in Pennsylvania used by America’s Continental Army during the Revolutionary War. During the winter of 1777-1778, the Army stayed at Valley Forge and endured many hardships, such as lack of food and harsh, cold weather. Since then, Americans have had great respect for the soldiers who suffered there because of their example of patriotism.

Revolutionary War: The war fought by the American colonies against Great Britain. The war began because the British mistreated the colonists. The colonies won and established the United States as a new nation.

In God We Trust: The official motto of the United States. Congress made it the official motto in 1956, although it first appeared on U.S. coins during the American Civil War. It is printed on all U.S. currency today and is a reminder that belief in God was the foundation of America’s commitment to individual liberty and has played an important role throughout America’s history.

E Pluribus Unum: A motto often used in the United States which, translated from Latin, means “Out of many, one.” The motto dates to the founding of the country and describes how people in 13 states became one nation. Today, it is often interpreted to mean that people from around the world can become citizens of the United States. It consists of 13 letters, which symbolize the original 13 colonies. It appears on the Great Seal of the United States and on all U.S. currency today.

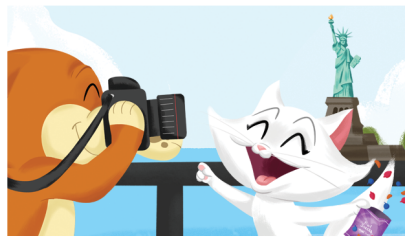

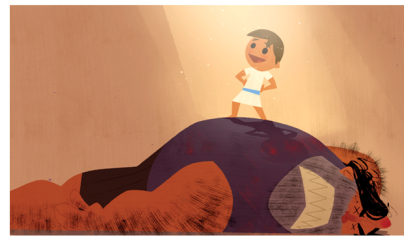
